Church Words by Rev Anne Potter



Twelve days before my eldest son was born, on the 2 April 1982, Argentine forces invaded the British overseas territory of the Falkland Islands, sparking one of the largest major conflicts since WW2. Lasting 74 days, the conflict was the first military action since the

Second World War that utilised all elements of the Armed Forces.

255 British personnel lost their lives defending the Falklands, of whom 86 were Royal Navy, 124 Army, 27 Royal Marines, six Merchant Navy, four Royal Fleet Auxiliary and eight Hong Kong sailors. Seven ships were also lost to enemy action and nine aircraft shot down.

Along with many of you I remember sitting watching the TV news. Often, in the early days, I was feeding a baby whilst watching news footage of soldiers boarding ships to travel down to the Falklands. Unlike the World Wars when folk went to the local cinema to watch Pathe News, the Falklands, some thirty-seven years later, the news of the war filtered into sitting rooms across the nation. Of course, today any news of war, such as the current conflict in Ukraine, is instantly on phones or people's wrists.

Remembrance Sunday is when Acts of Remembrance, often included in a church service, for those who died in the two Wars of 1914-18 and 1939-45, take place.

However there have been many others who have laid down their lives for their country since the end of the Second World War and we remember them too at this time. The poppies sold by the British Legion and worn by so many is an annual reminder of the cost of war, as well as a fund-raiser for the Legion in their continued support for the Armed Forces. The strapline of the British Legion is currently: "They don't know you, but they're willing to risk everything for you. Your poppy shows you care, and helps us to continue our vital work." In St John's Gospel (15:12-13) we read that Jesus told his disciples to love one another as he has loved them and that 'no-one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends'. Poignant words so often read at a Remembrance Sunday service. This is, of course, exactly what Jesus did when he laid his life up on the cross, revealing God's amazing love for each one of us. A love that is all



about God's redeeming grace.

And so, this year, if you wear a poppy to remember the fallen, give an extra thought to those who laid down their lives and those who were involved in the conflict 40 years ago in the Falklands War.

A NOTORIOUS LIAR.

An offence no longer heard of in the Courts but apparently in former times cognisable by Common Law, is mentioned in the Sessions Roll of 1628. A Broadwas parishioner was charged on presentment of the Constable with being "a notorious liar." Incidentally it was mentioned that he maintained lies "by oaths," and was often drunk, but these, which might nowadays be regarded as the tangible offences, were then mere aggravations.
