

Monthly musings from Rev Anne Potter

'The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field. It is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches.' Matt 13: 31-32

Not being an expert gardener or horticulturist, I researched what mustard seeds grew into on the internet. I already knew that a mustard seed is a tiny seed, as I have often passed mustard seeds around in an all-age service with children to show just how small they are. What I didn't know is that most mustard seeds, of which there are many varieties, grow into different shapes and size of mustard plant. In the right conditions a mustard plant can reach up to 20 foot tall and at its peak have multiple stems with lots of leaves and blooming flowers. So, is mustard a plant, tree or bush? Depending on the variety of mustard seed planted, it can grow into a tall plant, when in clumps or groups a big bush or a 'tree' that has pods containing mustard. As such there is not a generic mustard tree like an oak which grows from acorns, and most of us have heard the phrase from small acorns grow mighty oaks.

You are probably wondering where I am wandering with this discourse on the two-verse parable Jesus told his disciples about the kingdom of heaven being like a mustard seed. A mustard seed, like an acorn, is all about small actions. Actions of neighbourliness or volunteering that do not involve huge amounts of effort or time. Spending an hour, say once a week, visiting a local person who is on their own; stopping to talk or pass the time of day; saying hello to a passing stranger; dropping an item into the foodbank box; giving someone a smile. These actions could be seen as comparatively small and inconsequential yet put together these small acts of kindness gradually grow into a huge tree of community making our world and the relationships within it a better place. A huge tree in which those who are struggling, who are anxious, who are downhearted, who feel unloved, who feel rejected can find mental and spiritual safety. This

is the kingdom, the place, Jesus is talking about.

The place where, through small expressions of loving one another, we can reflect the love of God. There are many people throughout time who have simply been there when needed, offered a shoulder of sympathy, guided a youngster with words of wisdom, held a needy person's hand, given of themselves in so many small ways yet have left a huge legacy of who they were in the hearts and minds of those who knew and loved them. These 'saints' of the past, of the present and of the future have, are and will continue to intentionally sow mustard seeds, or acorns, to bring about heaven here on earth. What a wonderful world we would live in if the words of Jesus' parable were taken on board by the whole of humankind?

We can but live in hope......and it really doesn't matter whether the mustard seed grows into a plant, bush or tree, what matters is the message behind the mustard seed growing into something so big that it offers a place of safe sanctuary where all are cared for within the family of God.

Worcester, May 14, [1763] On the thanksgiving-day, at a certain parishchurch in this county, where there was a great deal of ringing, each of the bells was half-muffled, so that the *music* they afforded, was *cheerful* and *dolorous*. The minister sending to know the reason for it, the ringers returned for answer, that it was to express not only their *joy*, on account of the *Peace*, but also their *sorrow* and *concern*, at the late woeful *Tax* on *Cyder* and *Perry*.

Due to unforeseen circumstances the Jazz Night due to be held on Saturday the 10th June has had to be cancelled - pre-bought tickets will be refunded


thewise inspiring women
